French Film Festival London 2025

This year's French Film Festival London brings a varied and exciting line-up of 33 feature-length films screened over 12 days.

With many UK premieres, the selection showcases the variety of voices, forms and budgets that altogether represent the wealth and diversity of French cinema production.

From comedies to documentaries, from personal stories to social dramas and thrillers, many try to reflect on the present and the complex world we live in. With a particularly strong trend of French films with or by international actors and directors, French cinema in 2025 continues expanding beyond its borders while keeping its strength at home.

The small selection of restored films pays tribute to the late master documentary filmmaker Marcel Ophüls and to the great Isabelle Adjani who turned 70 this year.



The Great Arch

1982. French President François Mitterrand launches an international competition for the Great Arch of La Défense, aligned with the Louvre and the Arc de Triomphe. Against all odds, a Danish architect is thrust into this pharaonic project, where his vision collides with politics.

Following her Palme d'Or-winning *Titane*, **Julia Ducournau** returns with a genredelying vision that fuses body horror and coming-of-age to probe the intensity of family bonds.

With Nouvelle Vague, Richard Linklater (Before Midnight, Boyhood) captures the free spirit of a revolution in the making, paying homage to the French New Wave and its artists: Godard, Truffaut, Rohmer, Chabrol, Varda.

As mutual fascination deepens, so does their bond. Directed by Lucile Hadžihalilović, this "mesmeric melodrama" (*The Guardian*) won the Silver Bear for Artistic Contribution at the 2025 Berlinale.
