Launched in 2016, the Night of Ideas has become a worldwide project staged in 190 cities and 104 countries. In London and Edinburgh, the French Institute convenes **free debates and performances** to challenge our understanding of the world.

This year's edition will be launched by **Hélène Duchêne**, French Ambassador to the UK on **5 February 2026 at the French Institute in London**.

The opening event, placed under the umbrella of dance, will feature an improvisation with pianist **Karol Beffa** and ballerina and former Danseuse Etoile of the Paris Opera Ballet **Alice Renavand**. She will then be joined on stage by **Benoit Swan Pouffer**, Artistic Director of Rambert contemporary dance company. Together they will explore how dance can inspire us and move the world forward.

**Crossing French and British perspectives**, the Night of Ideas champions the free circulation of ideas to help apprehend the trends transforming our societies. Through a series of free and lively debates, leading guest speakers from both sides of the Channel will address **key issues of our times**.

They will engage the audience to tackle topics such as **global imbalances, geopolitical upheavals, the growing polarisation among Gen Z, AI in education, ending life ethically and shifting masculinities**.

The Night of Ideas is organised by the French Institute in London, in collaboration with the French Embassy to the United Kingdom, and the Embassy's Higher Education, Research and Innovation Department. It is supported by the French Institute's Trust and Patrons' Circle and Eurostar.

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*The Baltic Frontline*

European countries can no longer avoid addressing the challenges posed by Russia's recent choices and the long-term pressure they create for Europe's security and politics. From a Baltic and Northern European perspective, these threats are particularly acute: these States are Europe's strategic frontline and serve as laboratories for innovation in defence, democratic resilience and the fight against disinformation, offering important pointers for the future shape of Europe's security architecture.

### *Ethics, Law and Care at the End of Life*

19.40 – 20.50

Set against ongoing UK debates on the Terminally Ill Adults Bill and proposed legislation on assisted dying and palliative care in France, this panel will explore the legal, medical and social questions surrounding the end of life. It will clarify the tensions between individual freedom, medical responsibility and collective solidarity, forming part of the current, broader reflection on what it means to “die with dignity” and how societies frame or limit the freedom to choose one’s own death.

Representations of masculinity have become central to a wider cultural battle, with an imagined return to patriarchal order taking shape across digital and political spaces. In response to this rhetoric of lost virility, artists, researchers, and activists are reclaiming masculinities to explore their plurality, contradictions, and vulnerabilities. Between fragility and dominance, tenderness and performance, masculinity offers a lens through which to read our times. From couples to parenthood, masculinities are being redefined in the intimacy of daily life. What do these reconfigurations of the masculine reveal about how we live together?

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### *Global Imbalances: Is It Still Time to (Re)Act?*

Persistent global macroeconomic imbalances pose serious risks to the global economy. They fuel trade, financial and geo-economic tensions, they increase the risk of geopolitical fragmentation, and they hinder the ability to find solutions for common challenges such as climate change, development and inequalities.

Addressing global imbalances in a cooperative manner is a core point of the international agenda, including the French presidency of the G7 in 2026. Which solutions could be explored to respond urgent and long-term issues?

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### *Gen Z's Political Split*

Often seen as a progressive bloc, Gen Z is in fact deeply divided. In France, young voters increasingly back parties at opposite ends of the political spectrum. In the United States, recent polls point to a growing gender divide among under-30s, and in the UK, youth support is largely directed toward Labour, while many of their peers stay away from the polls altogether. Shaped by fragmented media ecosystems, this polarisation is reinforced by growing inequality, social decline, and distrust in politics.
