Ethics, Law and Care at the End of Life

19.40–20.50 – Library

Set against ongoing UK debates on the Terminally Ill Adults Bill and proposed legislation on assisted dying and palliative care in France, this panel will explore the legal, medical and social questions surrounding the end of life. It will clarify the tensions between individual freedom, medical responsibility and collective solidarity, forming part of the current, broader reflection on what it means to “die with dignity” and how societies frame or limit the freedom to choose one’s own death.

Representations of masculinity have become central to a wider cultural battle, with an imagined return to patriarchal order taking shape across digital and political spaces. In response to this rhetoric of lost virility, artists, researchers, and activists are reclaiming masculinities to explore their plurality, contradictions, and vulnerabilities. Between fragility and dominance, tenderness and performance, masculinity offers a lens through which to read our times. From couples to parenthood, masculinities are being redefined in the intimacy of daily life. What do these reconfigurations of the masculine reveal about how we live together?

Global Imbalances: Is It Still Time to (Re)Act?

Persistent global macroeconomic imbalances pose serious risks to the global economy. They fuel trade, financial and geo-economic tensions, they increase the risk of geopolitical fragmentation, and they hinder the ability to find solutions for common challenges such as climate change, development and inequalities. Addressing global imbalances in a cooperative manner is a core point of the international agenda, including the French presidency of the G7 in 2026. Gen Z's Political Split

21.10–22.20 – Library

Often seen as a progressive bloc, Gen Z is in fact deeply divided. In France, young voters increasingly back parties at opposite ends of the political spectrum. In the United States, recent polls point to a growing gender divide among under-30s, and in the UK, youth support is largely directed toward Labour, while many of their peers stay away from the polls altogether. Shaped by fragmented media ecosystems, this polarisation is reinforced by growing inequality, social decline, and distrust in politics.

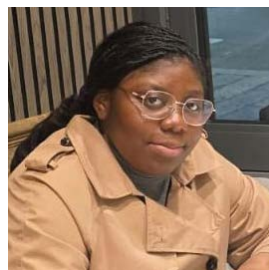
